



Question / Title for term – What is the Legacy of the Ancient Greeks?

Subject	Areas covered
Learning Enrichment	Visit from the "Southampton Art Gallery" to create clay art linked to the myth of Medusa
English	Reading, responding to and analysing a variety of texts in preparation for our writing including: narrative writing (creating Greek myths) and non-fiction writing (detailing aspects of life in Ancient Greece). As our curriculum is text-led, the children will throughout the term explore 'Leo and the Gorgon's Curse', 'Orchard Greek Myths', 'So You Think You've Got It Bad?', 'The Ancient Olympic Games', 'Who Let the Gods Out?' during the term as part of their reading and writing learning. There will also be opportunities for extended writing within other curriculum areas.
Mathematics	These areas will be taught through both mathematics focused lessons but also through topic lessons such as history/science etc. Number: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Four operations recap and practice • Fractions (including decimals and percentages) • Measurement Geometry: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Properties of shapes • Position and direction • Statistics
Science	Properties of materials, separating mixtures and reversible/irreversible changes.
Art and design	Landscape sketching and watercolour Use of clay to create a piece of artwork inspired by Ancient Greek culture and design
Computing	e-safety, with a particular focus on being aware of how to stay safe online. A further look into keeping our devices safe and our own data by being aware of strong passwords and the security of different websites and networks. Video editing and use of Crumble software and hardware to programme instructions.
Geography	Locating Greece and areas of the Ancient Greek Empire on maps at different scales
History	A study of Ancient Greek life and achievements and their influence on the western world.
French	Musical instrument and sport preferences
Music	Heroes of Troy-singing unit & musical composition
Physical Education	Tennis and swimming Athletics and dance
Relationships, Sex and Health Education (RSHE)	Along with the Science curriculum, the RSHE curriculum aims to protect children by ensuring they have knowledge of their bodies, the human life-cycle, emotions, acceptable behaviour and right and wrong. We use Heartsmart programme for our RSHE teaching and this term are focusing on "Too Much Selfie isn't Healthy" and "Don't Rub It In, Rub It Out"
Religious Education	We follow Hampshire's agreed syllabus for Religious Education "Living Difference IV" as well as using the Church of England "Understanding Christianity" resource to support teaching. We will also be exploring a unit focused on understanding Islam and the theme of Ummah and Community.
