With our cam toy creations, we got to put our own ideas into our own inventions. We also went back in time to have an Egyptian day where we collaborated to perform a play to one another. Sport's day was another joy as well as our final pond dip where we got see how many newts we have lurking beneath the depths of the school pond.

So what's the take away from the year? Well, if we look behind the scenes, the joy of learning seems to be greatest when we are focused, engaging together and using as many of our senses as possible. Best wishes for the summer from us all & thank you for the support.

Year 5 Summary

It is unbelievable we have reached the end of this academic year. Many of the Year 5 children have spoken about how quickly the year has flown by and we teachers feel the same way. We are sad to say goodbye to this cohort of children but we are excited at the same time about what we know they can achieve in their final year at St Mary's next year. The year group teachers would like to share the following A.A Milne quote which makes us feel more positive when we feel sad about moving on: "Don't cry because it's over; smile because it happened." The year has been full of highlights and here are just a few. In Autumn, the children came in fresh-faced ready to tackle their first year of upper school. Our first topic was 'How Significant Was Basing House?' where we learned about the Civil War that ravaged England in the mid-17th century. The children were curious about this history topic and we visited Basing House for our first trip where the English Civil War Society showed us what life would have been like for a soldier at the time. Later in the term, we started our second topic which was called 'Is There Anybody Out There?'. This science unit explored space and the children enthusiastically visited the Space Dome which dominated our school hall for the day. Through

our learning about space and forces, the children completed experiments using bottle rockets - firing these across the playground (safely!) will be remembered for a long time to come. A learning-filled first term now complete, we headed off for the Christmas break for a well-deserved rest. Spring came around quickly and we entered our 'What is the Legacy of the Ancient Greeks' topic. We flew back in time to uncover what life was like for the Greeks that lived in that time period. Much of our English learning was focused on this time period. The children wrote excellent Greek myths inspired by their paper and paste beasts they created in art. We had visitors from the Southampton Art Gallery who showed us how to make artwork using wire to create sandals worn by Achilles too. To complete our learning in spring, we took part in an Ancient Greek Olympics where the children ran, threw and even wrestled in the style of the Greeks.

Lastly, we've had our summer topic of 'In Which Biome Would You Rather Make Your Home?' where they investigated what different biomes around the world look like. Focusing primarily on Brazil and the Amazon Rainforest, the children learned about the wonders of life there and the importance of keeping our natural environment protected. After visiting the Gordon Brown Centre, the children learned about survival in a rainforest biome and they wrote survival guides to teach others how to brave this treacherous environment. As we approached the end of Year 5, the children made direct comparisons between the rainforest and other biomes, focusing on our temperate forest biome too. They created bags in DT to store survival items and made clay creatures they might find in a woodland in the UK. All in all, it's been a brilliant year and this special group of children have prepared themselves superbly for Year 6. Enjoy the summer, Year 5; you've earned it.

Year 6 Summary

What a fantastic year it has been and the summer term was full of happiness, laughter and marked the end of SATs revision! Upon returning to school after the Easter break, the children were bombarded with Maths and English to make sure they were ready for the KS2 SATs. All children performed excellently and should be incredibly proud of their results! Alongside this, children began working on the 'Golden Age of Islam,' making comparisons between life during 900AD Baghdad and the 'Dark Ages' in Britain in England at the time. Alongside this topic, many transition activities took place as children began thinking more about their secondary schools. As this was officially their last term at St Mary's, we spent lots of time reflecting on the past and what skills they could take forward. Furthermore, with final art assignments to complete, DT projects to finish and other foundation subjects to bring to a close, the children had to put in lots of effort, creating memories and pencil cases to take forward with them! Of course, we have to mention the play: Shrek. The children worked tirelessly to learn their lines and

perfect their acting skills. Every member of staff commented on the professionalism of the children and what wonderful voices they all have. Songs could be heard in the classrooms, on the playground and even hummed along to in the corridors as the three classes enjoyed practising prior to their performances. They should be proud of their efforts and thankful for all the support and guidance they have received! As the end of the year approached, the children, of course, began to get excited about the end-of-year celebrations. They experienced the annual Winchester Cathedral service, taking part in their activities linked to Ubuntu. It was a wonderful day out and the children represented St Mary's brilliantly. Entering the final week saw each class make their way to St Mary's Church for our annual pilgrimage. It was great to experience it in the church and the children enjoyed taking part in activities. It was a chance to remember their whole experience at St Mary's and to spend time with their peers. This left just the last few days together where we again focused on reflection and legacy. The Year 6 Leavers' service took place at the church and it was a time to share memories, jokes and farewells to all the children. One of the highlights for the children is certainly the beach party! End of year update for MFL

Our pupils at St Mary's are coming to the end of another amazing year where much French has been learnt!

Year 3 settled into their French lessons superbly and really loved sharing their knowledge of different languages. They have read The Very Hungry Caterpillar in French and enjoyed learning the days of the week and all the lovely foods the caterpillar eats! Having learnt parts of the body and colours, they were also able to create a monster and describe it in simple French. They loved this.

Recently, we read Jack and the Beanstalk in French and learnt the names of various vegetables. Then, the children designed their own seed packets with a vegetable of their choice in French.

Year 4 really enjoyed their travels around Europe and of course, this resulted in a glorious visit to our

French café in the hall! We were very lucky to receive amazing baked pastries from The Bakeshop and Tesco. There was also a choice of juices, water and French sirops to try. The children were amazing at ordering their snack and their drinks in French. Children and staff came in to help us from the MFL department at Costello, as well as one of our governors, Mrs Jarrett.

Mrs Malone also asked some musical colleagues to come in and play to us. It was a super morning. Since then, we have looked at sports that we may play and we've discussed how to keep healthy. The children designed a plate of healthy foods in French. We are now looking at travels abroad and types of transport we would use. We will also look at a few French speaking countries around the world.

Year 5 started the year looking at pizza toppings! They watched a film of some children in France making pizzas and then planned what their own perfect pizza would have on it, in French of course! We have some very sophisticated palates in Yr 5, as we had snails, sardines and artichokes! As the children were studying The Planets in science, we had a topic on this where the children began to gather vocabulary to describe some of the planets in French. They did a super job and learnt lots of grammatical rules about where adjectives are placed in a sentence.

The children also watched some musical videos and were able to express opinions on the type of music they liked, such as la musique classique or la musique jazz.

Year 6 started the year describing their school and what facilities we have here. This moved on to looking at our locality and what there is to do in Basingstoke. Lots it would seem!

We looked at telling the time and school subjects in French. The children were able to create their dream timetable for a day!

We have looked at quite a lot of grammar, particularly verbs in the infinitive, present tense of Être, Avoir, Aller and the near future. The children have looked at ways to further their writing by using conjunctions to create compound sentences. They have also produced work to stretch their understanding of adjectival agreements.

I wish them every success in Yr7 and I hope that their learning journey, in whatever language they choose to study, is a happy and successful one.

English - what you can do over the Summer

The 6-week summer holidays can be a tricky time to keep skills ticking over - as a school, we have a few suggestions you might wish to consider to get your children developing and/or refining their skills so they can hit the ground running when they return in

September. Firstly, completing the summer reading challenge is the best way to keep children reading regularly. It encourages children to read widely and often and the challenge motivates children to develop an intrinsic desire to read. Further information can be found on the summer reading challenge website. Reading regularly with an adult is absolutely vital to keep developing the key reading skills of retrieval (finding information within a text), inference (arriving at a conclusion using reasoning or evidence - not just assuming or 'quessing'), and clarifying (developing an understanding of the meaning of words in different contexts). If you're wondering what sort of questions you might ask your child whilst reading with them, the link shared (https://lexile.com/parents-students/toolsto-support-reading-at-home/21-questions-ask-childbook/) has some great suggestions. Even if your child is older and enjoys reading alone, showing that you are a reading role model is great to keeping up positive attitudes towards reading. Lastly, look for opportunities to write wherever possible. This might be something simple like writing letters/extended messages to family members or using prompts. The link shared here

(https://www.explorelearning.co.uk/free-resources/creative-summer-writing-ideas-for-the-school-holidays/) has some ideas for you to consider. Try and keep whatever you do light and fun - these optional extras are meant to inspire and engage.
